Mind the (Security) Gap: SAT Perceptions vs. Reality



As we see budgets for SAT increase, it's important to take a step back and ask the question: What results are we looking to gain from expanding our investment in SAT, and how does this investment help achieve them? Investing in more of the same, when it hasn't reduced your human risk, will only continue the same pattern at a higher cost. As security leaders spend more on security awareness, they should focus on outcomes that actually reduce human risk levels.
